

THE TERRITORY FOR THE SEAT OF GOVERNMENT.

No. 1 of 1912.

AN ORDINANCE

For the care, control, maintenance, and management of Public Places, and for the regulation of Traffic within the Territory for the Seat of Government.

BE it ordained by the Governor-General of the Commonwealth of Australia, with the advice of the Federal Executive Council, in pursuance of the powers conferred by the *Seat of Government Acceptance Act 1909* and the *Seat of Government (Administration) Act 1910*, as follows :—

1. This Ordinance may be cited as the *Traffic Ordinance 1912*.

Short-title

2. In this Ordinance—

Definitions.

“The Minister” means the Minister of State for Home Affairs.

“The Territory” means the Territory for the Seat of Government.

3.—(1.) The Minister may make, amend, alter, or repeal regulations with respect to the following matters :—

Minister may make regulations.

(a) the care, control, maintenance, and management of public places ;

(b) the regulation of traffic ; and

(c) the regulation and licensing of public vehicles and the drivers thereof, and the charging of a licence-fee.

(2.) All regulations made by the Minister under this Ordinance shall be notified in the *Gazette*, and shall come into operation on the day of the notification in the *Gazette* or on a later day to be specified in the notification.

4. Until the Minister makes regulations under this Ordinance the provisions of Ordinance No. 30 for the care, control, construction, formation, fencing, maintenance, and management of public places, and Ordinance No. 34 for the regulation of traffic in public places, made under the *Local Government Act 1906* of the State of New South Wales shall, so far as applicable, apply to the Territory as if they were regulations made under this Ordinance, provided that wherever the words "the Council" and "the Shire" appear they shall be read as if the Minister were the Council and the Territory were the Shire.
