# **University of Canberra Amendment Bill** 2006

### A Bill for

An Act to amend the *University of Canberra Act 1989* and for other purposes

The Legislative Assembly for the Australian Capital Territory enacts as follows:

1	Name of Act
	This Act is the University of Canberra Amendment Act 2006.
2	Commencement
	This Act commences on the day after its notification day.
