# **Multiculturalism Bill 2022**

#### A Bill for

An Act to promote multiculturalism in the ACT, and for other purposes

#### Preamble

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- 2 The Legislative Assembly—
  - 1 acknowledges and pays respect to the first peoples and traditional custodians of the ACT and other Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples living in, or connected to, the ACT, whose lands, winds and waters we now share; and
    - 2 recognises the diverse cultures, languages and beliefs of the first peoples of the ACT, and of the many other people who make up the modern ACT community; and
    - 3 believes that multiculturalism enriches the civic, cultural, economic, educational, political and social life of the ACT; and
    - 4 recognises that people of diverse backgrounds and experiences may face different forms of discrimination and disadvantage; and
    - 5 commits to ensuring the ACT is a harmonious and unified community where individuals, regardless of their backgrounds and experiences, feel included, respected and valued.
- The Legislative Assembly for the Australian Capital Territory therefore enacts as follows:

1	Part 1	Preliminary
2	1	Name of Act
3		This Act is the Multiculturalism Act 2022.
4	2	Commencement
5	(1)	This Act (other than part 4) commences on 1 September 2023.
6 7		Note The naming and commencement provisions automatically commence of the notification day (see Legislation Act, s 75 (1)).
8	(2)	Part 4 commences 12 months after this Act's notification day.
9	3	Dictionary
10		The dictionary at the end of this Act is part of this Act.
11 12 13		Note 1 The dictionary at the end of this Act defines certain terms used in this Act, and includes references ( <i>signpost definitions</i> ) to other terms defined elsewhere in the Act.
14 15		For example, the signpost definition ' <i>multiculturalism</i> —see section 6. means that the term 'multiculturalism' is defined in that section.
16 17 18 19		Note 2 A definition in the dictionary (including a signpost definition) applies to the entire Act unless the definition, or another provision of the Act provides otherwise or the contrary intention otherwise appears (see Legislation Act, s 155 and s 156 (1)).

3	5	Object of Act
4	(1)	The object of this Act is to promote multiculturalism in the ACT.
5	(2)	The object is to be achieved by—
6		(a) establishing and promoting the charter for multiculturalism; and
7		(b) establishing the council; and
8 9 10		(c) providing a framework for the review and continuous development of the government's promotion of multiculturalism.
11	6	Important concepts
12 13	(1)	For this Act, <i>multiculturalism</i> means actions, policies, principles, programs and services intended to—
14 15		(a) engage with and respect individuals of diverse backgrounds and experiences; and
16 17		(b) promote a better understanding of individuals' diverse backgrounds and experiences; and
18 19		(c) maintain an equitable, harmonious, progressive and unified community; and
20		(d) benefit from diversity.
21 22 23	(2)	For this Act, <i>diversity</i> means the different ways an individual identifies and expresses themself in the community, including through their culture, language, religious or spiritual belief.
24	7	Charter for multiculturalism
25		The charter for multiculturalism is set out in schedule 1

3	8	Establishment of council		
4		The Ministerial Advisory Council for Multiculturalism is established.		
5	9	Functions of council		
6		The functions of the council are to—		
7		(a) advise the Minister on—		
8		(i) ways to promote multiculturalism in the ACT; and		
9 10		(ii) the effectiveness of government policies, programs and other actions in promoting multiculturalism; and		
11 12		(b) consult with individuals and bodies in the ACT community about promoting multiculturalism; and		
13 14		(c) exercise any other function given to the council under a territory law.		
15	10	Director-general to give support		
16 17		The director-general must provide administrative support and facilities for the council.		
18	11	Membership of council		
19	(1)	The council is made up of—		
20		(a) the chair; and		
21		(b) the deputy chair; and		
22		(c) 9 other members.		

1		(2)	The Minister must appoint the—	
2			(a) chair of the council; and	
3			(b) deputy chair of the council; and	
4			(c) other members of the council.	
5			<i>Note</i> For laws about appointments, see the Legislation Act, pt 19.3.	
6 7		(3)	The Minister may appoint a person to the council only if the Minister is satisfied that the person—	
8			(a) is committed to promoting multiculturalism; or	
9 10			(b) has demonstrated leadership or expertise in contemporary issues relevant to multiculturalism.	
11 12 13		(4)	The Minister must take all practicable steps to ensure that the membership of the council reflects diversity, including by having regard to—	
14			(a) gender identities; and	
15			(b) age groups; and	
16			(c) residency or immigration status; and	
17			(d) generations of migrants and their families.	
18		(5)	An appointment must be for a term of not longer than 3 years.	
19		(6)	A person must not be a member of the council for more than 2 terms.	
20	12		Ending appointments	
21			The Minister may end the appointment of a council member—	
22			(a) for misbehaviour; or	
23 24			(b) if the Minister is satisfied that the member is, or is likely to be, unable to effectively exercise the member's functions; or	

1 2			(c) if the member is absent, other than on leave approved by the Minister, from 2 consecutive meetings of the council.		
3 4			Note A council member may resign from the council by giving signed notice of resignation to the Minister (see Legislation Act, s 210).		
5	13		Minister to give directions on council procedures		
6 7		(1)	The Minister must give the council a direction in relation to the procedures of the council, including—		
8			(a) how the council must conduct its proceedings; and		
9			(b) how frequently the council must meet; and		
10			(c) the records the council must keep or publish.		
11 12		(2)	The Minister must publish, for a reasonable period, a draft of the direction for community consultation before giving the direction.		
13		(3)	A direction is a notifiable instrument.		
14	14		Annual report by council		
15 16			The council must prepare an annual report under the <i>Annual Reports</i> ( <i>Government Agencies</i> ) <i>Act 2004</i> , section 7.		
17 18			Note An annual report direction may include requirements about the council's annual report (see <i>Annual Reports (Government Agencies) Act 2004</i> , s 8).

2		(1)	The director-general annual report for an administrative unit must, for a reporting year, include—	
4 5			(a) a statement about how the administrative unit has complied with section 15; and	
6			(b) a summary of—	
7 8			(i) comments received from any consultation carried out under section 15 (a) (iv); and	
9 10			(ii) any action taken by the administrative unit in response to the comments.	
11 12 13			Note An annual report direction may include other requirements about reporting on the charter for multiculturalism (see <i>Annual Reports</i> (Government Agencies) Act 2004, s 8).	
14		(2)	In this section:	
15 16			director-general annual report—see the Annual Reports (Government Agencies) Act 2004, section 6.	
17 18			reporting year—see the Annual Reports (Government Agencies) Act 2004, dictionary.	
19	17		Annual ministerial statement to Legislative Assembly	
20 21			The Minister must, as soon as practicable after each financial year, present to the Legislative Assembly a statement about—	
22 23			(a) how administrative units have complied with section 15 during the financial year; and	
24 25			(b) the government's priorities and strategies to promote multiculturalism during the following financial year.	

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### Part 5 Miscellaneous

#### 18 Review of Act

- 3 (1) The Minister must review the operation of this Act as soon as practicable after the end of every 5 years of its operation.
  - (2) The Minister must present a report of each review to the Legislative Assembly within 6 months after the day the review is started.

### 7 19 Regulation-making power

8 The Executive may make regulations for this Act.

- 3 The Legislative Assembly believes our community is enriched by the long and
- 4 continuous cultures of the first peoples of Australia and the diverse cultures,
- 5 languages, religious or spiritual beliefs of the many other people who have made
- our community their home. Accordingly, we say:

#### 7 Regardless of your background and experiences, and how you have

- 8 come to be in the ACT—
- 9 1 you are welcome and your contributions to our community are valued
- you are free and safe to express, practise, maintain and celebrate your cultural, religious and spiritual identity
- you are entitled to use, preserve and share your language
- you are free to participate as equals in the civic, cultural, economic, educational, political and social life of the ACT
- you are entitled to equitable access to information, services and programs provided to our community

#### 17 We have a shared responsibility to—

- value the contributions of all people, regardless of their backgrounds and experiences
- embrace and realise the benefits that diversity brings to our civic, cultural, economic, educational, political and social life
- create a harmonious and unified community based on mutual respect, trust and understanding
- end racism and other forms of unlawful discrimination.
