

Norgrove Park	The Norgrove family	Kingston Pioneers
	Cecil & Ethel Norgrove	Cecil and Ethel Norgrove lived in the Molonglo Internment Camp, which was built in 1918. In 1921/22 the unsold barracks were converted into 120 cottages and a tradesmen's barrack. The couple raised four children: Robert, Thelma, Alan and Stanley. Cecil made a particular contribution to the building of Canberra through his skill as a teamster, carting gravel from the Molonglo River up to the site of the Powerhouse building.
	Robert (Bob) William Norgrove	Bob (1920-1996) served in the Australian Army during World War II. In 1944 he married Pat Moore of "Jerrabomberra". He was an active member of various Bushfire Brigades, including Tidbinbilla and Williamsdale. He was a founding member of the Woden Brigade and later of Jerrabomberra. In 1993 he was awarded the National Medal for Emergency Service Personnel receiving the medal and second clasp. In 1994 he was made an Honorary Life Member of the Jerrabomberra Volunteer Bushfire Brigade.
	Thelma Black (nee Norgrove)	Thelma (1922-1986) worked for David Jones in the Monaro Mall in Civic for many years from the inception of the Mall. She then worked as a Public Servant for the Department of Foreign Affairs until her retirement.
	Alan Herbert and Sylvia Norgrove	Alan (1925-1977) worked for the Post Master General's Department all his life. He played football for the Canberra Rugby League Representative 1 st Grade Team against England in 1950 and France in 1955 in Canberra. Alan served in the Australian Army during World War II. After the war he worked tirelessly for War Veterans and their families through his fundraising efforts at the Kingston-Narrabundah RSL Club. He visited hospitals providing support where needed to War Vets and their families by writing letters, providing reading materials and confectionary. Alan was a founding committee member of the RSL Club and was their Chief Organiser for many years. He was made a Life Member in 1968, and the only member to be both a Life Member and Patron of the Club.
	Stanley (Stan) Alfred and Betty Norgrove	Stan (1928-1984) was employed as a transport driver for the Mugga Lane Quarry delivering the basic materials for the foundations of Canberra's buildings, until the quarry closed. He was then employed by the Department of Housing and Construction. The wives of these men worked tirelessly as Home Managers for their husbands, homes and children.
