

		James Ainslie was the first overseer of `Duntroon Station' in Canberra. He was employed by Robert Campbell to drive a mob of sheep south from Bathurst `until he found suitable land' in 1825, Ainslie chose the Limestone Plains (the Canberra district) in the same year. He was the overseer of the station for ten years before returning to Scotland.
		This road was formerly part of Ainslie Avenue.
