

Public Place Names (Phillip) Determination 2009 (No 1)

Division of Phillip: Names associated with the First, Second and Third Fleets

NAME	ORIGIN	SIGNIFICANCE
Guardian Place	HMS Guardian	A Royal Navy supply ship of the Second Fleet on sail to New South Wales but disabled by a submerged iceberg south of Africa in December 1789. The waterlogged ship with convicts aboard made a remarkable return to Table Bay in February 1790 and was wrecked in a gale two months later.
Surprize Place	Surprize (ship)	The smallest transport ship of the Second Fleet, <i>Surprize</i> , set sail from England with 254 male convicts in January 1790 and arrived at Port Jackson in June 1790. During the voyage 36 convicts died and 121 were sick when landed.
Wilbow Street	James William Wilbow (1768/69-1840) and Mary Wilbow (née Martin) (c1773-1847)	Convict James Wilbow from the Third Fleet ship <i>Salamander</i> landed at Port Jackson in 1791 and married convict Mary Martin from the Second Fleet ship <i>Neptune</i> in 1807. They were pioneer settlers of the Hawkesbury area, NSW, and James served as a district constable.
