Arthur Tange Street	Sir Arthur Harold Tange AC CBE(C) (1914-2001)	<p>Australian public service, diplomat, head of two major Commonwealth departments</p> <p>Sir Arthur was one of the most influential people in the government of Australia for nearly 30 years.</p> <p>Secretary, Department of External Affairs (now Foreign Affairs and Trade), 1954-1965.</p> <p>Australian High Commissioner to India, 1965-1970.</p> <p>Secretary, Department of Defence, 1970-1979.</p> <p>1953: Order of the British Empire – Officer (Civil) - Assistant Secretary of the Department of External Affairs.</p> <p>1955: Order of the British Empire – Commander (Civil) - Secretary of the Department of External Affairs.</p> <p>1959: Knight Bachelor - Secretary of the Department of External Affairs.</p> <p>1977: Companion of the Order of Australia for eminent and meritorious public service.</p>
Ashton Calvert Street	Dr Ashton Trevor Calvert AC (1945-2007)	<p>Australian public service, diplomat, head of a Commonwealth department, Rhodes Scholar</p> <p>Australian Ambassador to Japan, 1993-1998.</p> <p>Secretary, Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade, 1998-2005.</p> <p>During his career he also served with the Department of the Prime Minister and Cabinet, the Office of National Assessments and Department of Employment and Industrial Relations.</p> <p>2001: Centenary Medal for service as Secretary, Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade.</p> <p>2003: Companion of the Order of Australia for service to the development of Australian foreign policy, including the advancement of business relations between Australia and Japan, and for leadership and highly distinguished contributions to Australia's overall economic and security interests at critical times in the international environment.</p>

Carmody Street	<p>Sir Alan Thomas Carmody CBE(C) (1920-1978)</p>	<p>Australian public service, armed services, head of three Commonwealth agencies</p> <p>Essentially a Customs man, spending over half his career working in that department. He overhauled and simplified procedures for customs. As Secretary of the Department of Prime Minister and Cabinet, he worked hard to maintain the department's high standards and extended its capacity to provide independent advice to the prime minister across the full range of Federal government responsibilities.</p> <p>Deputy Secretary, Department of Trade and Industry, 1962-1966.</p> <p>Comptroller-General of Customs and Secretary, Department of Customs and Excise (later Department of Police and Customs), 1966-1975.</p> <p>Secretary, Department of Business and Consumer Affairs, 1975.</p> <p>Secretary, Department of the Prime Minister and Cabinet, 1976-1978.</p> <p>1964: Order of the British Empire – Officer (Civil) – Deputy Secretary of the Department of Trade.</p> <p>1971: Order of the British Empire – Commander (Civil) – Comptroller-General of Customs.</p> <p>1977: Knight Bachelor in recognition of service to the Public Service.</p>
Chuter Street	<p>Charles Edward Chuter (1880-1948)</p>	<p>Public service, Queensland</p> <p>Responsible for the <i>City of Brisbane Act 1924</i> which established the Greater Brisbane scheme. It endowed Brisbane City Council with the unprecedented 'general competence' power to govern the city and enabled the council to respond imaginatively to unforeseen problems, without the delays and frustrations of having to seek specific authority from parliament.</p> <p>Assistant Under-Secretary, Home Secretary's Department, 1922.</p> <p>Under-Secretary, Department of Health and Home Affairs, 1935.</p> <p>Acting-Director of Local Authority Affairs, 1941.</p> <p>Director of Local Government, 1943.</p>

Lansdown Crescent	Robert Broughton Lansdown AO CBE(C) (1921-2006)	<p>Australian public service, Canberra</p> <p>First Chairman of the National Capital Planning Authority, 1989 -1991 (now the National Capital Authority).</p> <p>During a difficult early period for the Authority, he supplied the quality of leadership needed from the Commonwealth Government's statutory agency to facilitate the transition of the ACT to self-government.</p> <p>1977: Order of the British Empire – Commander (Civil) – housing, environment and community development.</p> <p>1991: Officer of the Order of Australia for service to communications.</p>
Loveday Crescent	Cynthia Loveday (nee Nelson) MBE (1924-2006)	<p>Australian public service, diplomat</p> <p>In 1962, Cynthia Loveday was the first Australian career female diplomat to attain the rank of Counsellor (in Washington DC). She held previous postings in Delhi, Paris and Saigon.</p> <p>1980: Order of the British Empire - Member (Civil) for public service.</p>
Neil Currie Street	Sir Neil Currie CBE(C) (1926-1999)	<p>Australian public service, head of three Commonwealth agencies, ambassador</p> <p>Deputy Secretary, Department of Trade and Industry, 1959-1971.</p> <p>Secretary, Department of Supply, 1971-74.</p> <p>Secretary, Department of Manufacturing Industry, 1974-1975.</p> <p>Secretary, Department of Industry and Commerce, 1975-1982.</p> <p>Ambassador to Japan, 1982-1986.</p> <p>1972: Order of the British Empire – Officer (Civil) for service as Secretary of the Department of Supply.</p> <p>1978: Order of the British Empire – Commander (Civil) for meritorious public service to industry and commerce.</p> <p>1982: Knight Bachelor in recognition of service to the public.</p>

Overall Avenue	<p>Sir John Wallace Overall CBE(C) MC and bar (1913-2001)</p>	<p>Australian public service, war service</p> <p>Inaugural Commissioner of the National Capital Development Commission (NCDC), 1958-1972.</p> <p>Sir John made a significant contribution to the development of Canberra through his role in the NCDC.</p> <p>He was awarded the Royal Australian Institute of Architects Gold Medal in 1982, and was a member of the Parliament House Construction Authority that oversaw construction of the new Parliament House.</p> <p>During the 1990s the former NCDC building in Northbourne Avenue was named the John Overall Offices in his honour.</p> <p>1941: Military Cross – AMF – Middle East</p> <p>1942: Military Cross – AMF – Middle East</p> <p>1962: Order of the British Empire – Commander (Civil) – Commissioner of the National Capital Commission</p> <p>1968: Knight Bachelor – National Capital Development Commission</p>
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Powley Street	Leonard Wilfred Powley (1906-1980)	<p>ACT public service</p> <p>Len Powley joined the Victoria Police in 1926 and served in some of the toughest parts of Melbourne where inter-gang warfare was rife. In 1939 he joined the fledgling police force in Canberra and rose to become Commissioner of the Australian Capital Territory Police in 1965-1966.</p> <p>Within the Canberra community he was a past president of the Eastlake Football Club; involved in various roles with ACT Australian Football League; a member of the Masonic Lodge and involved in community work through Rotary ACT, the Police Association and Police Boys Club.</p>
Roni Ellis Lane	Roni Ellis (1947-2000)	<p>Australian public service</p> <p>A senior officer in the Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade who made a unique contribution to building an understanding of Indigenous ways, values and history in Australia and overseas.</p> <p>The Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade introduced the <i>Roni Ellis Indigenous Study Award</i> to serve as a memorial to her and an incentive for Indigenous students to follow her example in fighting the odds to achieve their goals.</p>
Therkelsen Lane	Judith Caroline Therkelsen (1953-2007)	<p>Australian & ACT public service</p> <p>Involved in government policy and program administration including the 2003 Bushfire Recovery Task Force, Aged Care Policy, Multicultural Affairs including refugees' settlement, Chief Minister's Office, Chief Minister's Department, Education, Local Government. Ms Therkelsen's career spanned over 34 years of service from Department of Defence temporary typist to ACT senior manager.</p>

Westerman Street	<p>Sir Alan Westerman CBE(C) (1913-2001)</p>	<p>Australian public service, head of two government agencies</p> <p>An outstanding leader in the Australian Public Service, Sir Alan's contribution to Australian trade policy was significant at an important time in Australia's international trading history. He is particularly remembered for his key role in leading trade negotiations with Japan.</p> <p>Chairman, Commonwealth Tariff Board, 1958-1960</p> <p>Secretary, Department of Trade, 1960-1971</p> <p>1957: Order of the British Empire - Officer (Civil) - First Assistant Secretary - Department of Trade.</p> <p>1962: Order of the British Empire – Commander (Civil) – Secretary of the Department of Trade.</p> <p>1963: Knight Bachelor – Secretary of the Department of Trade.</p>
Wilenski Street	<p>Dr Peter Stephen Wilenski AC (1939-1994)</p>	<p>Australian public service, diplomat, head of several Federal agencies</p> <p>Dr Wilenski was a physician, head of four Federal Government departments and the Public Service Board; adviser to prime ministers and governments; reformer of the public service; a diplomat who represented his country at the United Nations; an eminent scholar and an author on public policy issues.</p> <p>Secretary-designate, Department of Labour and Immigration, 1975.</p> <p>Secretary, Department of Education and Youth Affairs, 1983.</p> <p>Chairman, Public Service Board, 1983-1987.</p> <p>Secretary, Department of Transport and Communications, 1987-1988.</p> <p>Australian Ambassador to the United Nations, 1988-1992.</p> <p>Secretary, Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade, 1992-1993.</p> <p>1987: Officer of the Order of Australia - for service to international relations and to public sector reform, particularly through fostering the implementation of social justice and equity principles.</p> <p>1994: Companion of the Order of Australia - in recognition of his outstanding service to Australia and to humanity at large.</p>
