NAME	ORIGIN	SIGNIFICANCE
Bruce Dittmar Street	Bruce Dittmar (1929-2008)	Community service to war widows, orphans and the disabled as an active member of the Returned and Services League of Australia for 55 years. He was a committed Legatee for 20 years and a member of Technical Aid for the disabled in the ACT for 10 years. He was formerly an Australian veteran of the Korean and Vietnam campaigns.
Cammack Lane	Eileen Cammack OBE (1914-2000)	Community service as a hospital and army medical officer, first woman mayor of Penrith for three terms, patron of the Girl Guides and Nepean Historical Society, foundation president of the Business and Professional Women's Club in Penrith, and president and life member of the Penrith and District Chamber of Commerce.
David Walsh Avenue	David Walsh (1798-1873)	Gungahlin pioneer who in 1861 purchased 72 acres in the Mulligans Flat area. His sons Matthew and John each acquired an adjacent 50 acre block in what is now the suburb of Forde. He was buried at Riverside cemetery, Queanbeyan.
Deeble Street	Jack Deeble OAM (1924-2003)	Community service to scouting in Victoria and the ACT from 1934 to 2003, and executive secretary of the Australian Academy of Science for 25 years. He was also secretary to the Goodwin Homes for the aged, chairman of the ACT Child Welfare Committee and the foundation rear commodore of the Canberra Yacht Club.
Desmond Lane	Richard Timothy (Dick) Desmond (1932-2005)	Community service to Northern Territory and ACT. Canberra volunteer who assisted with the resettlement of Darwin residents post-Cyclone Tracy and supported World Cup Athletics held in Canberra in 1985. He was a junior and senior soccer coach in the ACT, 1975-1985. He also managed some ACT

soccer teams and from 1998-2003 coached and umpired ACT Bowls teams.

Son of Richard Desmond.

Peter Timothy Desmond
(1966-1983)

Community service in support of ACT charities, represented the ACT in soccer and trialed with several UK soccer clubs prior to his death at age 17. He features in the Marist College Hall of Fame and is commemorated by a memorial scholarship at the Belconnen Soccer Club.

Fell Street

Helen Wilson Fell
(1849-1935)

Community service, diarist, philanthropist. Helen Fell was a Sydney charity worker on the board of Crown Street Women's Hospital, and the National Council of Women. She was a member of the Kindergarten Union of NSW and the YWCA. She also supported the Dunmore Hostel for Girls, Presbyterian Social Services Committee and Burnside Homes.

Fennessy Way

Bernard Vincent Fennessy OAM
(1923-2006)

Community service as a volunteer guide and educator at the Australian National Botanic Gardens from 1988. Prior to this, he was a CSIRO biologist noted for monitoring myxomatosis and undertaking research to control feral rabbit populations in rural Australia. In his retirement he was narrator for more than 100 'talking books' to assist the visually impaired.

Horneville Street

Emily Margaret Horneville
(c1882-1979)

Community service to Indigenous people. As an elder of the Muruwari community, north of Brewarrina, NSW, Emily Horneville (pronounced Horn-e-ville) helped nurse the ill during the 1919 influenza epidemic. Later, in the 1970s she provided valuable information on the language of her people.

Leslie Dwyer Street

Leslie John Dwyer
(1892-1962)

Community service, early Canberra photographer, advocate for Manuka.

Leslie was involved with Canberra's building program 1924-1929 and later worked as a professional photographer. He was an active member of the Canberra

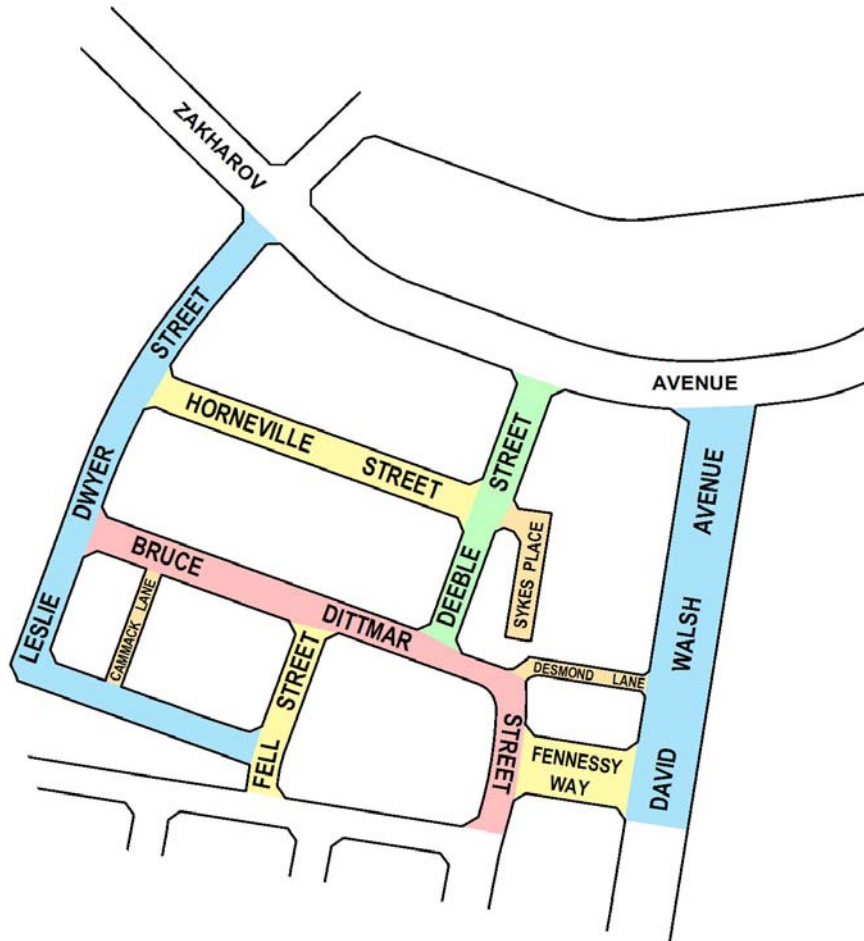
Chamber of Commerce, president of the Manuka Traders Association, a foundation member of the Royal Canberra Golf Club and the Federal Golf Club and was active within the Canberra Bowling Club. In 1961 he was the Canberra Bowling Club's singles champion.

Sykes Place

Judith Aileen Sykes
(1933-2006)

Community service Canberra.

As the first residential support worker at Karinya House for Mothers and Babies, Judith Sykes was a devoted staff member and volunteer. She provided practical and compassionate assistance to pregnant women who lacked appropriate accommodation and support.
