George Kemp	George Kemp	Coachman and groom
Park	(c.1869-1892)	Arrived in Australia from Scotland circa 1890. Employed by Edward Kendall Crace of Gungahleen, Ginninderra. Both men were drowned while attempting to cross the flooded Ginninderra Creek (<i>Gininderra Creek</i>) on 20 September 1892. George's body was recovered ten days later by Christy Donnelly and Samuel Shumack. He was buried in St John's Churchyard on 1 October 1892.
Yurwang Dhaura	Yurwang is a word from the Ngunnawal language.	Aboriginal language Yurwang meaning 'strong' and Dhaura meaning 'ground'.
	Dhaura is a word from the Ngunnawal and Ngarigu languages.
