Garth Close	Edward Garth (c.1763-1823)	Transported in the First Fleet; settlers Norfolk Island and Van Diemen's Land
	Susannah (Sussannah) Garth (nee Gough) (c.1763-1841)	Edward Garth arrived on the 'Scarborough', reaching Botany Bay on 19 January 1788; Susannah Gough arrived on the 'Charlotte' on 20 January 1788. They were among the first group selected to settle Norfolk Island under the command of Lieutenant Philip Gidley King. Edward worked a land grant at Grenville Vale cultivating livestock and grain. He was elected to the Norfolk Island Settlers Association in 1793 and later made an overseer of sawyers. By 1805 Edward was a second-class settler with his wife Susannah and six children. The family left Norfolk Island for Van Diemen's Land in December 1807 aboard the 'Porpoise' arriving Derwent River in January 1808. The family re-established on extensive land holdings at Clarence Plains, Queenborough and Brown's River.
