DIVISION NAMES WITH REFERENCE TO ORIGIN

NAME	ORIGIN	SIGNIFICANCE
CRACE	Edward Kendall Crace (1844-1892)	One of the original settlers in the area; became one of the largest landholders in Gungahlin.
NICHOLLS	Douglas Ralph Nicholls (1906-1988)	Aboriginal sportsman, pastor, social reformer and awarded an OBE in 1968, he was appointed Governor of South Australia and Knighted in 1976.
CASEY	Sir Richard Gardiner Casey (1890-1976)	Governor General of Australia 1965-1969; 1931 elected to the Federal Parliament served as a Minister 1932-1942 and 1950-60; appointed member of the British War Cabinet and British Minister of State for the Middle East; 1944 appointed Governor of Bengal.

NAME	ORIGIN	SIGNIFICANCE
KINLYSIDE	George Kendall Kinlyside (1877-1945)	From a well known pioneer family in the Ginninderra/Hall area. He was active in local affairs, being joint secretary of the Hall Progress Association when it was established in 1906.
TAYLOR	Florence Mary Taylor (1879-1969)	Australia's first woman architect, engineer and town planner, awarded OBE in 1939.
NGUNAWAL		Named after the local Aboriginal Tribe of the Gungahlin District.
MONCRIEFF	Gladys Moncrieff (1892-1976)	A musical comedy star making her debut in "HMS Pinafore" in 1914; as a result of her concerts to troops in World War II and in Korea she became known as "Our Glad".
AMAROO		Aboriginal word meaning "beautiful place".

NAME	ORIGIN	SIGNIFICANCE
HARRISON	Peter Harrison (1918-1990)	Chief Planner of the National Capital Development Commission (1959-1967). Served as a member, National Capital Planning Committee.
KENNY	Elizabeth Kenny (1886-1952)	Nurse responsible for devising a treatment for poliomyelitis; during an epidemic of polio in Queensland in 1933. Her methods were investigated and officially recognised by the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis in the USA in the 1940's.
FRANKLIN	Stella Maria Sarah Franklin (1879-1954)	Novelist; her first novel "My Brilliant Career" published 1901; under the terms of her will the Miles Franklin Award is made annually for an outstanding Australian novel.
MULANGGARRI		Ngunawal word for "Alive" and "Wellbeing".

NAME	ORIGIN	SIGNIFICANCE
CLARRIE HERMES DRIVE	Clarrie Hermes (1921-1990)	RAAF 1940-1946, Flying Officer; Stipendiary Magistrate 1963- 1970; Senior Assistant Secretary, Attorney General's Department 1970- 1975, 1977-1980; Minister, Australian High Commission in London 1975-1977; Chief Magistrate, Canberra 1981- 1984; Chairman, Disciplinary Appeals Board under Public Service Act 1984- 1988; Deputy Chairman, ACT Credit Tribunal 1986-1990.

GUNGAHLIN DRIVE

Gungahlin
Homestead; Built
in 1862. Sold to
Edward Kendall
Crace in 1877 and
remained in the
family until it
was resumed by
the Commonwealth
for the Federal
Territory. Site
is listed on the
Register of the
National Estate.

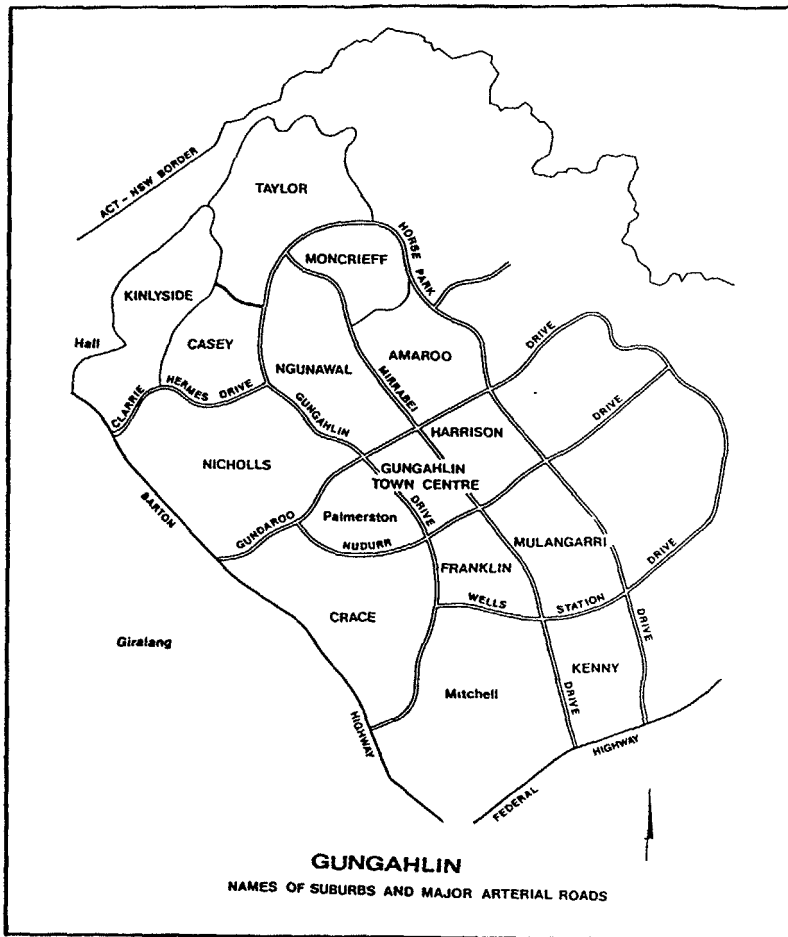

SCHEDULE 'A'

NAME	ORIGIN	SIGNIFICANCE
HORSE PARK DRIVE		Horse Park Homestead; one of the first homesteads in Gungahlin area, built in 1853 for John Gillespie. The site is classified by the National Trust.
GUNDAROO DRIVE		Gundaroo Drive; commemorates the name of an existing road associated with the area since the days of early settlement.
MIRRABEI DRIVE		Ngunawal name for Tribal Elder Matilda Sissy Williams, died 1981.
NUDURR DRIVE		Ngunawal word meaning "Red Ochre" was high significance to the Gungahlin area where the tribe dug for ochre.
WELLS STATION DRIVE		Wells Station Homestead; land first owned by John Scott, original Homestead built in 1850's by George Rolfe. The site is classified by the National Trust.
