## AN ORDINANCE

### To amend the Industrial Board Ordinance 1936-1938.

BE it ordained by the Governor-General in and over the Commonwealth of Australia, with the advice of the Federal Executive Council, in pursuance of the powers conferred by the *Seat of Government Acceptance Act 1909-1938* and the *Seat of Government (Administration) Act 1910-1933*, as follows:—

1.—(1.) This Ordinance may be cited as the *Industrial Board Ordinance (No. 2) 1938*. Short title and citation.

(2.) Section one of the *Industrial Board Ordinance 1938* is amended by omitting sub-section (2.).

(3.) The *Industrial Board Ordinance 1936-1937*, as amended by the *Industrial Board Ordinance 1938*, is in this Ordinance referred to as the Principal Ordinance.

(4.) The Principal Ordinance, as amended by this Ordinance, may be cited as the *Industrial Board Ordinance 1936-1938*.

2. Section nineteen of the Principal Ordinance is amended— Penalty for breach of determination by private employers or private employees.

(a) by omitting from paragraph (c) of sub-section (2.) the word “or”; and

(b) by adding at the end of that sub-section the following paragraph:—  
“or (c) an inspector appointed under this Ordinance.”.

3. After section nineteen of the Principal Ordinance the following section is inserted:—

“19A.—(1.) The Attorney-General may appoint such inspectors Inspectors. as he considers necessary for the purpose of securing the observance of this Ordinance and the regulations and of determinations and industrial agreements made under this Ordinance.

“(2.) An inspector shall have such duties, and shall make such investigations and reports in relation to the observance of this Ordinance and the regulations and of any determination or industrial agreement made under this Ordinance as the Attorney-General directs.

“(3.) For the purpose of carrying out his duties under this section, an inspector may, at any time during working hours, enter any building, place or premises of any kind wherein, or in respect of which, any industry is being carried on, or any determination or industrial agreement has been made, or any offence against this Ordinance is suspected, and may inspect any work, material, machinery, appliances, articles, book or documents therein.

“(4.) An inspector shall report to the Attorney-General any breach of this Ordinance or the regulations or of any determination or industrial agreement which comes to his knowledge.

“(5.) Any person who hinders or obstructs an inspector in the exercise of his duties shall be guilty of an offence.

Penalty: Fifty pounds.”
