1 Name of regulations

These regulations are the *Crimes (Forensic Procedures) Regulations* 2000.

2 Commencement

These regulations commence on the day they are notified in the Gazette.

3 Definitions for regulations

In these regulations:

forensic scientist means a person engaged (whether as an employee or otherwise) in that capacity by—

- (a) the Australian Federal Police; or
- (b) the police force or police service of a State.

forensic technician means a person engaged (whether as an employee or otherwise) in that capacity by—

- (a) the Australian Federal Police; or
- (b) the police force or police service of a State.

the Act means the Crimes (Forensic Procedures) Act 2000.

Note A definition in this regulation applies to the entire regulations unless the definition, or another provision of the regulations, provides otherwise or the contrary intention otherwise appears (see *Interpretation Act 1967*, s 11F and s 11G, as applied by the *Subordinate Laws Act 1989*, s 9).

4 Appropriately qualified persons

For section 13 of the Act, a person mentioned in an item in Schedule 1 is qualified to carry out a forensic procedure mentioned in the item.
